Peer approval is commonly valued and sought during adolescence and sometimes leads to acceptance-driven decisions.


An opportunity to be part of their social landscape is essential.

Opportunities to be involved in service to the local and global community are important in the middle years. Our Middle School Philosophy Responds To Our Learners



Homework Expectations In Year 7

- 30 minutes per evening in Term 1 (10 minutes for English, Maths, and Languages)
- 45 minutes to 1 hour (approximately 10 minutes per core subject per timetabled lesson each day and 10 minutes for languages) in Terms 2 to 4
- Students only complete homework for core subjects in Terms 2 to 4, which includes Maths, Science, English, Religion and Humanities and language practice and revision
- Skills Builder Homework Program (Literacy)





Types of Homework

Homework Type	Purpose
Study/Revision	Allows students to review and contemplate the concepts/content learnt in class and recall it to memory
Practice	Helps students retain information for longer periods
Rehearsal	Students permanently remember new information and develop confidence in their role
Preparation - 'Flipped Learning'	Encourages students to acquire background information, or bring their prior knowledge and experiences to upcoming lessons or units of study
Relative to Assessment	Students can self-manage the completion of their assessment tasks and develop time management skills

Languages

- All students will be placed in a core class that will study Japanese or French
 4 times a week in either Semester 1 or 2
- There is no expectation that the student has studied the language before
- Language study offers insight into another culture, promotes cultural understanding and a greater ability to appreciate and respect other cultures in our global and multicultural society
- Compass students will also study either French or Japanese for one semester depending on the level of interest from the majority of students entering the Compass Program



Languages Continued...

 In Year 8, students will continue to study the same language for the whole year with 3 lessons per week

• From Year 9 onwards, if a student wishes to continue with the language they have been studying, they will choose it as one of their electives and study it for 3 lessons per week



Core Language Classes

Practical ways to support your student's transition include:

- Labelling all equipment, resources and uniforms with the student's full name and phone number
- Creating a morning routine that focuses on building the student's independence and confidence with key tasks
- Using task checklists at home with visual reminders
- Creating routines regarding homework
- Creating a home study space
- Practicing taking public transport to and from school
- Becoming familiar with the College Planner and school policies



Ways to emotionally support your student's transition include:





Plant the idea with your student that coming to high school is a restart – an opportunity to do new things and engage in transformation of self



Remind them of the skills they have that will be their greatest superpowers at high school



Before the school year begins take your student's emotional pulse and reassure them of their supports



Encourage your student to create some personal goals for starting high school



Create opportunities for your student to have fun, challenge themselves in new ways and develop their socialisation skills

Home Room Buddy Program


- Assist in the transition of students during orientation (answer questions, guide students around the school, direct students to staff where appropriate)
- On the first day Home Room Buddies will (through Home Room time) welcome students and guide them through their new routines at Brigidine. New routines include; timetables, locks/lockers, laptops and using SEQTA, day to day happenings, travelling between classes etc.
- Home Room Buddies will also act as a support person for Year 7s in transitioning to secondary school.
- They will ensure the Year 7s know where their House Leader's office is and go through with them "what to do if"
- They will also assist students with directions on how to travel safely to school by public transport where necessary. This will continue throughout their time at Brigidine.

- Parents will be sent a video with how the computers are used, how to set up their accounts and a summary of the rental agreement and the College's Responsible use of computer policy.



Private Lessons

- 30 minutes once per week
- Group lessons available
- Lessons occur during the school day, with a rotating schedule
- Fees are managed through the school, due each term
- Reports provided each semester
- Exams are available, but not mandatory
- Student concerts held for performance opportunities
- Limited number of instruments available for hire

Ensemble Information

- All groups require a year long commitment
- Most ensembles incur an annual fee excluding Junior Choir, Beginner Brass, Beginner Strings, Percussion Ensemble for Year 7
- Music ensembles require a performance uniform available for purchase through St Brigid's Cloak
- Fees include:
 - Teacher/tutor costs for all rehearsals and events
 - Entry to events and competitions
 - Transport to events during school hours
 - Costumes for dance troupes


